4.0 Indigenous Counsellor Report – Muriel Sampson

Muriel distributed her Counsellor report

- We are in need of suggestions for Elders to bring on campus.
- Jody Noah brought up the idea of having a regional meeting of Post Secondary IEC's. The University of Windsor has the same vision. The Committee agreed it would be a good idea to pursue. Its good to hear what other institutions do to meet the needs of Indigenous students. Donna Grayer asked if that would be for all Southwestern Ontario. Jody suggested that it probably wouldn't be all of SWO and may be done as a gathering rather than a formal meeting/committee.
- Darlene Marshall asked about the APSIP date that was changed and ended up being a date where their students (WECDSB) could not attend. She was hoping they could reschedule something and also to ensure in the future that the date works for all boards. Muriel suggested they work toward a separate event for the WECDSB students to make up for that day.

Indigenous Advisor Report

Tina distributed her Learner Advisor report

- Jody Noah suggested that for events with lack of attendance that she's had success with offering session in the evening and on weekends.
- Jody shared that her niece was a student and dropped. She is wondering if there's anything we can do for helping students transition into the college like a Mentorship program. Art Barron explained the new Transition Orientation for students with disabilities where they provide extra support for those students. Art suggested working with Danine Depauw to organize a specific transition event for Indigenous Students. Donna suggested that we create an Indigenous FAQ that is Indigenized, perhaps with some slang in it for that transition.
- Discussion was held regarding the blanket exercises. We have feedback forms that have been submitted and the feedback has been excellent! The content is powerful and Muriel and Tina have been tweaking it to make it real for the participants by using dolls and making it more regional. It was discussed that a lot of students still don't know about what happened in residential schools. The Committee members were surprised that some students are still not taught these things in schools. The blanket exercise is being done at the Faculty Retreat so the message is getting out to our teaching staff. Donna Grayer asked to be invited to the next Blanket Exercise.
- Darlene wanted to emphasize that we need to have mental health resources for the blanket exercise. We don't know how some students will react to the content. She also cautioned that staff doing blanket exercises must take care of themselves because it can affect them as well.
- Tina discussed that we are looking to post different Indigenous languages throughout the Centre. Jody shared that students that come from BC can't believe that there's very few outward signs of

Indigenous culture around the city. In BC its everywhere. Those signs make Indigenous students have a sense of belonging. Tina would like to explore doing that throughout the college grounds. Donna Grayer suggested that she thought we could try to make it fun since Indigenous cultures are very humorous. We tend to talk a lot of serious issues of trauma and so it would be nice to show that side of Indigenous culture.

Jody asked how the mental of our students have been. Tina observed that students don't seek help until its overwhelming. In general there has been an increase in the occurrence and complexity of mental health issues. The College has increased in person services through CMHA on campus as

well as promote 24/7 mental health online services. We have Gerri General and Muriel Sampson on campus who are Indigenous Counsellors. The College has release a mental health strategy that we

- A Barron presented the College update which is attached.
- Welcome Centre is scheduled to be completed by September 2024. That will house all the services that a new student would need with technology to help with automating appointments.
- Chatham campus renovated 3 rooms, hallways and rooftop units. Signage has been upgraded as well.
- Enrollment is at 16000 students including all campuses. We are still doing a 60/40 split of domestic to international student.
- We had a Career Expo in Chatham at the Bradley Centre bringing in Grade 7 to grade 12 students from all three school boards and the Christian School. And then at night, on the Wednesday night the 18th, we had it open for the community and anyone to come through for a job career fair. We had 2000+ students plus 880 people for the evening session.
- Mark Benoit would like to increase the number of Indigenous general education courses. We are offering one through the dual credit program and he is looking at offering more to all college students.
- The Anishinabek Educational Institute (AEI). St. Clair college in Spring had 48 students in 5 programs. For Fall we offer Native ECE in Muncie, and also in North Bay. We also have practical nursing and personal support worker, so for Fall we had a total of 98 students at AEI, which is really significant. We have seen a huge increase enrollment. Some discussion was had regarding how AEI chooses programming. Mark indicated that if anyone wanted to see new courses there, that he could bring it forward.

INDIGENOUS THOUGHT LEADERS CIRCLE

I was invited to become a member of the Indigenous Thought Leaders Circle for OCQAS. OCQAS is the Ontario Quality Assurance Service. This is an Indigenous Circle that gathers to discuss incorporating Indigenous Knowledge/Ways of Doing into the Ontario College Quality Assurance Process. They are looking at incorporating narrative into the QA process. I attended a zoom meeting on Friday December 1st. Discussion continued for quality standards of service for Indigenous Services. SPIEQAA- Standards of Practice for Indigenous Education Quality Assurance Audit. Discussing developing a survey and gathering student stories for quality assurance. All are still at discussionary stages.

INDIGENOUS PEOPLES EDUCATION CIRCLE

I attended the meeting held at La Cite in Ottawa on Thursday October 12th and Friday October 13th. Discussion was held on OPSEU/CEC Kaplan Award and Indigenous Knowledge decision. The TRC Gathering was discussed and Fanshawe offered to host the next Gathering. The last TRC Gathering was just before lockdown in March 2020. The OCAS Data Pilot Project was discussed, and all colleges should have access to the data.

The CICAN Indigenous Education Symposium was also discussed and IPEC members were encouraged to attend. It was held in Regina, Saskatchewan. I would like to attend the Symposium next year. I have never attended one yet.

It was also discussed that IPEC needs a full-time Coordinator. The Universities and the Indigenous Institutes have a funded Coordinator position, however, the Colleges do not. More discussion is needed, and a proposal needs to be drafted and submitted. IPEC outreach and partnerships have grown tremendously over the years and requires a dedicated person full time to do the work.

The next meeting will be in Peterborough on Thursday February 8th and Friday February 9th.

HIGHER EDUCATION SUMMIT IEC GATHERING

Assisted in the planning for this meeting that was held in Toronto on Tuesday November 28th. Three main issues were discussed: Indigenous Identity, Indigenous Knowledge and Observance of Truth and Reconciliation Day. The meeting was structured as breakout sessions for each topic and follow up sharing to the entire group. This was the first time the meeting was held during a weekday and not on the Saturday it is usually held on.

New Era of Nursing in Chatham-Kent




Nursing students studying in Chatham will no longer have to travel down Highway 401 to complete their degree thanks to a revised agreement between St. Clair College and the University of Windsor.

Super Saturday for Three St. Clair College Saints Nation Teams in October


