On Monday May 6th, Indigenous Services partnered with Library Services to have a student information booth "pop up" for MMIWG2S Day which was on May 5th.

ALUMNI POW WOW

St. Clair College hosted the Alumni Pow wow on Thursday May 9th, Friday May 10th and Saturday May 11th, 2024.

BKEJWANONG KINOMAAGEWGAMIG TOUR

On Wednesday May 15th, the Grade 6/7/8 classes from Walpole Island came to tour South Campus in Windsor. There were 39 students in attendance. Indigenous Services provided a quick presentation in the Indigenous Centre for the students.

POP UP WITH LIBRARY SERVICES

On Wednesday May 15th, Indigenous Services partnered with Library Services to have a student information booth "pop up" for the Moosehide Campaign Day on May 16th.

MOOSEHIDE CAMPAIGN

On Thursday May 16th, Indigenous Services participated in the Moosehide Campaign event held at Windsor Regional Hospital. Indigenous Services set up an information booth and participated in the walk.

Meetings

ONTARIO COLLEGE COUNSELLORS AGM

This meeting was held virtually on Monday January 22. It provided updates from the OCC and the OCC elections were held. The PD component focused on international students and supports. The CICMH International Toolkit was shared.

WOMEN BUILDING FUTURES

On Monday January 29th Indigenous Services met with Joanna Cloud from Women Building Futures. She shared information about her organization and opportunities that are available to Indigenous Women. Indigenous Services will share the information with students and invited Women Building Futures to set up a booth at the Alumni Pow wow.

INDIGENOUS THOUGHT LEADERS CIRCLE

I was invited to become a member of the Indigenous Thought Leaders Circle for OCQAS. OCQAS is the Ontario Quality Assurance Service. This is an Indigenous Circle that gathers to discuss incorporating Indigenous Knowledge/Ways of Doing into the Ontario College Quality Assurance Process. OCQAS are looking at incorporating narrative into the QA process. I attended a zoom meeting on Wednesday March 13th. Discussion continued for quality standards of service for Indigenous Services. SPIEQAA- Standards of Practice for Indigenous Education Quality Assurance Audit. There was discussion on developing a survey and gathering student stories for quality assurance. A draft was shared for review. This included four new requirements: 1. Indigenous Action Plan, 2. Teach faculty and staff how to work with Indigenous students – Indigenous Ways of Teaching and Learning, 3. services for professional development for faculty and staff to work with Indigenous Students and 4. report on activities of Indigenous Centres in the college. St. Clair College is one of the first colleges tentatively scheduled to go through this audit of Indigenous Services for 2025. More information will be forthcoming in June.

INDIGENOUS PEOPLES EDUCATION CIRCLE

I attended the meeting held at Fleming College in Peterborough on Thursday February 8th and Friday February 9th. Discussion was held on OPSEU/CEC Kaplan Award and Indigenous Knowledge decision. The TRC Gathering was discussed and will be deferred until 2025. The last TRC Gathering was just before lockdown in March 2020. The OCAS Data Pilot Project was discussed, and all colleges should have access to the data.

It was also discussed that IPEC needs a full-time Coordinator. The Universities and the Indigenous Institutes have a funded Coordinator position, however, the Colleges do not. More discussion is needed, and a proposal needs to be drafted and submitted. IPEC

outreach and partnerships have grown tremendously over the years and requires a dedicated person full time to do the work. This is ongoing.

An Indigenous Institutional Capacity review was undertaken. St. Clair participated in this review. The review was discussed at the IPEC meeting in Toronto at Centennial College on Thursday May 9th and Friday May 10th.

I did not attend the last IPEC meeting due to the dates conflicting with our Alumni Pow wow. I will need to find out when the next meeting is held and the location.

CBSA OUTREACH

On Tuesday March 5, Tina and I met via Teams with Peter Mayhew – Regional Indigenous Affairs Advisor for the Southern Region. Discussion focused on outreach and recruitment initiatives for students interested in a career in Customs and Border Services. There was a virtual session on Tuesday May 28 from 1pm to 2pm shared with the students.

IEC RETREAT

An IEC retreat was held on Wednesday March 6th at the Delaware of the Thames Community Room. Local First Nations were invited to discuss moving Indigenous Education Forward. The next Community meeting is tentatively in July. Caldwell First Nation has offered to host the next meeting.

CICMH INDIGENOUS MENTAL HEALTH COMMUNITY OF PRACTICE

This meeting was held on Monday March 18th. An Indigenous Student survey will be coming out. Indigenous Mental Health Supports were discussed.

Indigenous Counsellors were discussed. Not all colleges have Indigenous Counsellors. It is important that Indigenous students have Indigenous staff in place to support them. The next CICMH Conference is November 13th, 2024.

NEXT DIMENSION

I was invited by Pete Needham the President of Next Dimension to partner on an initiative to increase FNMI Women in Careers in IT. I initially met with Pete on Tuesday March 26th at Next Dimension. I am assisting with creating a local FNMI network of Partners to support this initiative.

APSIP SWO WEEK PLANNING

On Tuesday April 30th, Indigenous Services had a meeting with the University of Windsor regarding APSIP SWO week in the Fall. Tentative schedules needed to be forwarded to APSIP.

SOUTHERN FIRST NATIONS POST-SECONDARY COLLABORATIVE

The SFNS PS Collaborative meeting was held on Tuesday May 7th. The Institutional Spotlight was on Fanshawe College. Fanshawe's Indigenous Education Framework was shared with the Collaborative. Discussion was held on how each institution could assist SFNS Nations regarding economic leakage on post-secondary education. What impacts each institution is having on SFNS Nations. How could each institution enhance its positive impacts for SFNS Nations. How each institution could reduce any negative impacts for members of the SFNS Nations. The next meeting is scheduled for July 24th.




PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The Senior Team thanked MPP Gretzky for taking the time to visit our campus and for her advocacy and support of public education.








7. St. Clair Jr. Saints Check Presentation

The St. Clair Jr. Saints basketball program raised \$10,000 this past season for athletic scholarships. Over the past year, there have been over 100 youth participating in the house league, basketball camps and tournaments in our region and across the province. The St. Clair Jr. Saints Basketball organization was founded in 2019 and run by St. Clair College Basketball Alumni – Jimmy Parsons, Steve Brnardic and Greg Layson.

The purpose of the organization is to give St. Clair College Basketball Alumni the opportunity to remain in the game of basketball in the community and/or with their kids. The St. Clair Jr. Saints Basketball Organization has a total of 4 teams in the boys and girls divisions, ranging from 10-17 and are looking to expand, allowing for youth in the community to experience the greatness that St. Clair College has to offer their top-notch athletic facilities.

The St. Clair Jr. Saints Basketball Organization runs a Summer basketball camp, house league and skills sessions for kids in the community of all ages and is also a member of the OBA (Ontario Basketball Association). Way to go, Jr. Saints!





8. Alumni and Student Pow Wow

The College co-hosted a Pow Wow for Alumni and students, in conjunction with the University of Windsor, from May 9-11, 2024 at the SportsPlex. A Pow Wow is a sacred gathering of Indigenous peoples to honour the past, renew friendships and celebrate with music, song, food, dance and storytelling. Attendees were able to experience brilliantly coloured regalia representing Indigenous legends and lore, and listen to the grounding beat of the drum with songs about warriors, respect and social life passed down by the elders. Attendees were also able to visit many vendors, sample Indigenous cuisine and browse authentic Indigenous artwork, crafts, carvings, beadwork and jewelry.

Attendance over the three (3) days was approximately 3,550 and consisted of the following:

- Thursday, May 9, 2024 50 attendees (for the Contemporary Performance in the Student Life Centre).
- Friday, May 10, 2024 2,000 attendees (including 900 students bussed in from local School Boards) with 69 dancers.
- Saturday, May 11, 2024 1,500 attendees with 87 dancers.
- 53 volunteers over the 3 days.
- 33 vendors including 4 food vendors.

These statistics are outstanding and show that the Indigenous Community has truly embraced this event.



9. City of Windsor's "Strengthen The Core" Plan

On Friday, May 10, 2024, the College provided the City of Windsor with a Letter of Support offering the College's endorsement of the recently announced "Strengthen The Core" plan to revitalize Windsor's downtown. 11. Chatham Academic Awards Luncheon




12. Jill of All Trades Event
